Man pipes up on club rules

As a pipe smoker for almost half a century, smoking even on the tennis court and the golf course, Alvin Orlian was steamed when the country club he paid more than \$45,000 to join enacted a rule

against it.

"In view of the fact that I have been a member of private country clubs for about 40 years, it would have been impossible for me to anticipate such an unheard-of rule," Orlian, of Boca Raton, wrote in January in his letter of withdrawal from the membership of Falls Country Club near Lake Worth. "Obviously, I would not have become a member if I had any idea such a rule would be put into effect."

Orlian, who joined the club in 1986, demanded a full refund of \$45,000 in membership fees plus a \$5,000 initiation fee and \$1,000 special assessment, as well as a pro-rated refund of his \$2,000 in dues.

The club never responded and,

on Monday, Orlian sued.

"This man, when he joins the club, wants to smoke and socialize and relax," attorney Kenneth Lip-man said. "The point is that he belongs and then they change the rules after the fact.

Orlian, 65, began smoking a pipe when he was 17. He smoked one when he met with a club official before applying for membership, he wrote in his letter, and he smoked a pipe at every meeting of the club's board of governors.

"At no time prior to my receiving a draft of the club rules was I apprised of the fact that not only could I not smoke a pipe but could not bring an unlit pipe into the clubhouse," he wrote.
